ATTENDANCE



Careers

Open your eyes

In partnership with our feeder primary schools and Cardiff Commitment, our Year 7 cohort took part in talks to raise awareness of the various careers available to them. Renishaw, HMRC and Admiral Law gave presentations to all pupils and opened the floor for questions.



Careers Wales

Year 7 pupils were also lucky enough that Careers Wales organised for "Bad Wolf" to come and inspire them to work hard and achieve their goals.

Our new Careers Adviser, Leigh, has settled in well to the school and has started to see Year 11 pupils in preparation for their transfer to post-16 education. Leigh is also giving talks through the Pastoral rota to ensure all pupils are aware of the wide range of opportunities available to them when they leave Corpus Christi.

Pastoral

Every fortnight pupils receive an hour's pastoral session in order to develop their awareness of themselves, the world around them and their communication skills.

This term Year 7 has focused on topics to help them settle into Corpus Christi. They have looked at Welcoming, Homework, Learning Styles and Action Planning.

Year 8 pupils have looked at the society and world that we live in by studying: Democracies and Dictatorships, Child Labour, UN Rights of the Child and Smoking.

Year 9 have looked at the effects of drugs on the body, bullying and have received talks from entrepreneurs to inspire them about their future.

Year 10 and 11 are working on a rota programme where they have lots of external visitors coming in to discuss a wide range of topics. We have Public Health Wales, The Principality, Red Cross, Teenage Cancer Trust, Going Public, Cardiff and the Vale College, HE Roadshow with Cardiff University, and MacMillan. Within the school we also study Mental Health Awareness through DEAL (Developing Emotional Awareness and Listening), Parenting, Resuscitation and Checking for Cancer.







On the 13th November, 20 Pupils from Year 9 took part in the Digital Day Competition. Yard Digital were our industry professionals and they came in to help the 4 groups of 5 pupils to produce innovative solutions to problems.

Why?

Theo Blackwell, Chief Digital Officer for London says "There should be no barrier to a career in digital. The next great technological leap could be just as likely to come from a child currently sitting at a school desk in Southwark or Sutton as Silicon Valley, if we inspire our young people and give them the opportunity to explore their digital potential. BIMA Digital Day gives children across London and the UK the chance to put their digital skills to the test on real world challenges so that, in the future, they might be inspired to help solve those problems for real."

Speak to virtually any student who takes part in BIMA's Digital Day and you'll hear much the same thing: I didn't realise. Despite the fact that most young people leading lives inseparable from digital, they rarely consider a career in digital. That's what BIMA's Digital Day seeks to address by bridging the gap between industry and education.

The challenges

Challenge 1: Vodafone Digital Day Challenge

The high street has long been the heart of town and city life in the UK. Design a tool using either AR (augmented reality) or VR (virtual reality) technology to increase peoples enjoyment of the high street

Challenge 2: The Football Association Digital day challenge

The England Women's Football Team (The Lionesses) are competing in next year's FIFA World Cup in France in July 2019. How could you increase the number of people following it and encourage girls to play more football?

Challenge 3: BBC DIGITAL DAY CHALLENGE

BBC's upcoming digital-only program Earthlings will focus on children and young adults around the world, comparing the daily lives of people across 7 continents over 14 episodes. How would you digitally market this program?

The groups chose any one of these challenges and worked on the 4 D's of Digital: Discover Decide Design and Deliver.





The pupils laboured hard for 4 hours on their solutions, brainstorming ideas, researching and designing their end products. Finally, they presented their ideas to the rest of the groups. All pupils showed great team work and ICT skills. Their collaborative approach used a variety of tools, which allowed them to work on the same presentations at the same time. Fingers crossed we get shortlisted again this year! Great effort, da iawn!









<u>History Department</u> Corpus Remembers Week

To commemorate the centenary of the end of the First World War, preparations for a memorial garden began in July 2018. Students planned and created a memorial 'Remembrance' garden in the Courtyard of the school grounds. Students helped to clear the weeds and overgrown areas of the courtyard, erect a bench to provide seating, designed and ordered a memorial plaque and planted poppies and other plants. On November 9th a Remembrance service took place in the Courtyard. A representative from the British Legion attended and six Year 9 students, who are cadets, also took part.

To understand the wider experiences of war, the History Department organised a WWI cross-curricular week from November 5th-9th for all students in Year 9, where all subjects had a WWI focus. To give a few examples, students made trench biscuits in Food Technology, in English they studied and wrote their own WWI poetry, they designed their own recruitment posters in ICT, looked at casualty statistics in Maths and the use of chemical weapons in Science.

A whole-school WWI event was organised for the Friday lunch time.

Several interactive stations were created. The British Legion and Firing Line Museum came in to school to talk to the students. Students could try on uniforms, hold a replica Lee Enfield rifle, look at trench art and books from the time and ask questions. Students could sample trench stew and cake (made by Mr Hayman!), and the trench biscuits which they had made in Food Technology. They shared their own war stories and wrote messages of Remembrance and thanks. The work they created throughout the week was on display. The humanities department were even dressed up in WWI themed costumes for the event!

A series of Remembrance Day assemblies, led by pupils in form group 9R, also took place throughout the week. These gave all students the opportunity to reflect on the importance of Remembrance Day.

Not only did the week enhance the pupils understanding of the war, they also found the experience extremely meaningful and enjoyable. During the day, money was also raised for the British Legion.











Year 7


Year 8 pupils have been working with commitment to create detailed and accurate observational drawing sheets in their sketchbooks. Some fabulous studies achieved.









Past papers should be completed steadily over the course of the week so that pupils can refer to books, online support or seek help from their teacher when necessary. All questions should be attempted. Parents will be informed if pupils fail to meet submission deadlines or show insufficient effort.

Frequent consolidation is crucial. To support students' retention of key skills pupils will also be set weekly online revision tasks on either MyMaths or MathsWatch (login details were sent home last term).

MOBILE PHONES


The school has a very clear policy about the use of Mobile Phones by pupils on the school premises.

Pupils are **NOT** allowed to use their phones under any circumstances. If a pupil needs to contact home in an emergency, their Head of Year, Assistant Head of Year or the school office will assist them in this.

If a pupil has their phone confiscated, it is returned at the end of the day. If, however, it is subsequently confiscated, then this will involve a longer period of confiscation of up to a week. If a child's bus pass is on their phone, the office will lend them the bus fare to get home, but please inform the school via email (bmullins@cardiff.gov.uk) if you would prefer to make arrangements yourself to collect your child rather than let them make their own way home without their mobile phone.

Clearly, it is in everyone's interest that pupils do not have their phones taken and if parents could remind their children about this we, as a school, would be grateful as it makes life much easier for all concerned.

Year 10 SWEET Group Cardiff City Centre Homeless Project



On 14th December we went to Cardiff City Centre to see how homeless people live. Before our visit we found out what the homeless need and we decided to wrap and give out socks, hats and biscuits to whoever we could find sleeping rough on St Mary's Street and Queen Street. We decided to donate some hats and socks to The Huggard homeless Centre. We learned from a member of staff that it offers a day centre and 18 hostel rooms and for vulnerable people at night they offer floor space.

We also visited the Big Moose, a new charity focused café which has opened in Cardiff, dedicated to getting homeless and disadvantaged people back into work by mentoring them in food and hospitality roles.

From this experience we have become more aware of homeless people and their issues and we know about the help that the centre offers and that Cardiff is one of the best cities for helping the homeless.

TO BE SAFE

- When the bus arrives, wait for it to stop before boarding
- Get on and off the bus carefully pushing or rushing can cause accidents
- Always wear your seat belt and stay in your seat for the whole journey – it could save your life
- On a school bus, stay in your seat for the whole journey
- . On a public bus, find a seat if one is available
- Store your bag or other belongings safely and out of anyone's way
- Let the driver drive without distraction during the journey
- Take care of the bus
- Never spit or smoke
- Never be rude to other learners or the driver
- · Never interfere with driver controls or safety equipment
- · Never throw anything in or from the bus
- Only operate the bus doors or exits in an emergency and don't get off the bus until it has stopped
- Always follow the instructions of the driver or passenger assistant
- If there is an accident, stay on the bus until you are told to leave – but leave the bus by the safest exit if it is unsafe to stay on the bus
- When crossing the road find a safe place where you can be seen by all other drivers
- Please tell a teacher, parent or driver about any bad behaviour you see






