SCHOOL UNIFORM

At Corpus Christi we take pride in the high standard of uniform which is described below. Jumpers, ties and girls' trousers have to be bought from YC Sports in Crwys Road who are our approved suppliers. Pupils are not allowed to buy jumpers from other suppliers and sew badges on to them. From time to time during your child's years at Corpus Christi, the school may clarify or adapt its uniform rules in response to changing fads or fashions.

The following items are compulsory :

BOYS

Black traditional style trousers.

No jeans or 'jean-like' trousers.
No belts, buckles or adornments.

White long-sleeved shirt (winter)

White short-sleeved shirt (optional in summer). Both are to be worn tucked in.

Clip-on school tie - kept in good condition.

V-necked black pullover with badge.
This is a compulsory part of the uniform to be worn at all times unless at the discretion of the staff eg. hot weather

Black shoes or completely black trainers.

Black socks.

GIRLS

Black trousers with a moderate bootleg.

No 'skinny' trousers or 'jean-like' trousers.
No belts, buckles or adornments on the trousers.

OR Black 'A' line or pleated skirt. (The length of the skirt must be no longer than mid-calf and no shorter than just above the knee)

White long-sleeved shirt-type blouse (winter)

White short-sleeved shirt-type blouse (optional in summer). Both are to be worn tucked in.

Clip-on school tie - kept in good condition.

V-necked black pullover with badge.
This is a compulsory part of the uniform to be worn at all times unless at the discretion of the staff eg. hot weather

Black low-heeled shoes or completely black trainers. No boots are allowed.

Black knee length socks (not over the knee)
OR thick tights (winter). **Black ankle socks (summer).**

SCHOOL UNIFORM

Prefect

As above, but with a distinctive tie.

Outdoor Wear

Coat, fleece, anorak or mackintosh - in plain black. Leather or material of a similar appearance is not allowed. School scarf or plain black scarf.

Fleeces are allowed as long as they are:

Completely black. Different coloured linings or collars are not permitted.

Three-quarter length or waist length jackets are not permitted.

Hairstyles

Hair must be kept neat and tidy.

No shaving, patterns, outlandish styles or colours are allowed. Boys' hair must not be longer than the bottom of their shirt collar or shorter than a number '2' blade.

Jewellery and Make Up

1 watch and one signet ring are allowed.

Girls are also allowed one pair of small studs or sleepers in the lobes of their ears only.

No other form of studs or body-piercing is permitted

No make-up or nail varnish is allowed.

Inappropriate jewellery is confiscated for a month. Trainers and inappropriate clothing are kept for at least a week

Equipment

Children need, of course, to be equipped for lessons. All pupils must therefore have with them :

- Ruler
- Pencil
- 2 Pens
- Set of coloured pencils (not felt pens)
- Rubber

Pencil sharpener

Many parents/carers will be buying new uniform during the summer holidays. Please note that "Skinny" trousers and short, tight lycra skirts are NOT ACCEPTABLE. Also, footwear must be completely black with no coloured markings of any sort.

Spelling Bee 2015 Champions!

On Thursday 2nd July Spanish students Alexandru Smarandescu and Justine Wan, Year 7, took part in the National Spelling Bee Final Competition held in Cardiff University, accompanied by Geraint Tansey, Mrs. Carrington and Mrs. Harvey.

Having made it to the final, Alex and Justine were already in the top 49 spellers in Wales, out of the 3695 who had started the competition at the beginning of the year.

The competition started with lunch and registration and both Alex and Justine were able to get in some last-minute revision before being hustled into a lecture hall to be introduced to the panel of judges - Paul Kaye, a European Union Commissioner who had travelled from London, Phil Murphy, a STEM ambassador and fluent French speaker, and two members of the Consejería Espanola from Manchester.

The competition looked fierce; schools from all over Wales were competing and some had brought large crowds of supporters. Both Alex and Justine stayed calm and even seemed to enjoy the building atmosphere of tension and nerves before we took our seats for round 1.

Each pupil had 1 minute to translate as many words as possible into Spanish and then spell them using the Spanish alphabet - before we knew it both Alex and Justine had been in front of the judges and other schools to try their best. Waiting for the results to be announced was excruciating; would the judges prefer our pupils with their perfect pronunciation, or go for other pupils who favoured speed over accent?

In the end Alex made it through to the final, with Justine missing out on just 1 point in order to go through. Like a true professional she put all her energy into helping Alex prepare for the final, testing him on the 200 words he may be faced with!

At 3:15, after enjoying some cake to boost our energy levels, we took our seats to watch the other languages compete in the finals, marvelling at how quickly they whizzed through the words and Alex began to look apprehensive about competing in front of such a large audience. Alex was up first and performed brilliantly, passing only one word but remembering his accents excellently. As we waited to see how well the others had done Alex ran over in his mind how he could have done better, but Geraint was able to distract him by performing some magic tricks with a pack of cards!

Finally, the moment of truth was upon us - how well had Alex done? The competitors names were read, in reverse order and it began to be apparent that Alex had done very well indeed! As second place was read out, we let out a cry of happiness - Alex had won the whole competition, he was the best speller in Wales! As we watched him collect his cup, trophy and certificate we all felt huge pride and gratitude that all his hard work had paid off, a fantastic achievement.
