Message from the Head Teacher

The end of the term and the 2015/16 academic year is almost upon us. The summer break is tantalisingly close! As usual, there is a sadness associated with this time of year because we are saying farewell to a number of colleagues who are either retiring or moving on to pastures new. Mr Walentin is in a category all of his own, since he is retiring from his full-time post as Head of English but returning to us as a part-time teacher in September. This will enable him to spend a little more time with his family but, at the same time, his experience and expertise will not be lost immediately. Having previously been Head of English in St Cadoc's School (precursor to Richard Gwyn High School) in Barry, he is one of a dwindling number of teachers who have been at Corpus Christi since the very beginning. Mr Walentin has led one of the most successful English departments in the whole of Wales, which is no mean feat! We are delighted that he will be returning in September on a part-time basis.

Mrs Cath O'Leary, second in the English Department and Key Stage Three Learning Coordinator, is retiring after working in Catholic Education for the whole of her teaching career. She began her career in Lady Mary High School, moved for promotion to Bishop Hannon and then returned to Corpus Christi in 1987 when the Catholic schools in Cardiff were reorganised. A gifted and inspirational teacher, Mrs O'Leary is renowned for her love of her subject, her organisational skills and her devotion to her pupils, her loyalty to the school and her love of the outdoors, often in evidence during various Duke of Edinburgh excursions. She will be missed by everybody who works with her, but we wish her every happiness in retirement.

He has organised countless liturgies, regularly organised the Sacrament of Reconciliation, led retreats, and done all manner of pastoral work with pupils and their families that nobody will even know about. He has been a steady, discreet, strong and caring presence in the school, leading the spiritual side of our endeavours in a powerful and prayerful way. Everyone wishes him a long and happy retirement, although he will actually be doing more work in his parish!

The Music Department of Corpus Christi is losing its Head of Department, Mr Nick Rhydderch, to Stanwell School in September. Mr Rhydderch has been at Corpus Christi since 2003 and he has been instrumental (sorry!) in building the department into a strong and vibrant place where music-making is innovative and fun. The orchestra has gone from strength to strength under his tuition and baton. Mr Rhydderch has always been an enthusiastic teacher within and beyond the classroom and his kindness to all around him will never be forgotten. A man of immense integrity, we wish him every happiness and success as he moves to the Vale and pastures new.

Another person who is retiring, having spent over twenty years working behind the scenes supporting our pupils, is Mrs Vera Edwards, our School Counsellor. Tucked away in her little office which has been an oasis, or safe haven, for so many of our pupils, and the good work that she has done is literally immeasurable. Vera is kind, caring, a superb listener and a very wise person, and all these qualities have been used fully to enable many pupils to cope with the stresses and strains of life. We owe Vera an enormous debt of gratitude and wish her every happiness.

Ms Marion Reniez has been covering Mrs Carrington's maternity leave for the best part of a year and it is with sadness that we see her return to France in the summer. Formerly a French Assistant here, she has done great work with her classes and has been a constant smiling presence around the school. We wish her 'Bon Voyage' and 'Bonne Chance'!

Mrs Caroline Willis, one of our Administration Assistants, who has also been with us for just a year, is moving on. Her base has been in 'Enquiries' and she has been a very welcoming face at reception, helping children, visitors and staff. She is moving to St Bernadette's in September and our loss is very much that school's gain!

Finally, we say farewell to two past pupils, Georgia Emes and Rachel O'Brien, both of whom have been working as Support Teachers with our pupils this year. The work that they have done, often one-to-one or in small groups, has been incredible and invaluable. A graduate of Bristol University, Georgia is now going off to work for the NHS. There is no doubt that she will have a very successful career. Rachel is heading off to Cardiff Metropolitan University to study English and Media and I will not cease to encourage her to eventually go into teaching! She has such a gift for working with young people that I hope, in the long term, will not be wasted.

Mrs Stella Walters has worked part-time with countless pupils over many years, supporting Literacy on a one-to-one basis. A gifted teacher who knows virtually everything about teaching reading, writing and spelling, she, too, has decided to retire. We would like to thank her most sincerely for all that she has done and wish her a long and happy retirement.

In terms of new roles in the school, warm congratulations are offered to Mr D Harris (Key Stage 3 Learning Coordinator), Mrs E Lynch (Head of English), Miss L Harris (Second in the English Department), Mrs R Maclaughland (Head of Year 7), Mr W Hayman (Assistant Head of Year 7), Miss A Thomas (Assistant Head of Year 8), Mr J Roberts (Assistant Head of Year 10), Mrs S Wilson (Assistant Head of Year 11), Mrs N Evans (Head of Music) and Mr E Diaz (School Chaplain). It will certainly not be long at all until they are all settled into their new roles and doing great work.

I would like to end the final newsletter of the year by thanking all the staff and governors for their hard work, the pupils for theirs, and you, the parents and carers, for your support. Much great work has been done this year in so many different areas of school life. I hope that everybody has a restful, safe and happy summer break. Lost Property is kept in the Enquiries Office. It is vital that items such as coats, jumpers and PE kits are named so that they can be returned promptly if lost. Pupils are encouraged to check at Enquiries for any lost items and may ask to look through the lost property cupboard during break and lunchtimes. However, a large amount of lost property accumulates each term and cannot be held indefinitely. Unclaimed lost property is therefore cleared at the end of each term, i.e. at Christmas, Easter and Summer.



The Enquiries Office is currently receiving numerous requests to change notes into coins, e.g. for canteen purchases or bus fares. Please note that cash is not held in the School and change cannot be given to pupils. Thank you for your understanding.





SCHOOL UNIFORM

At Corpus Christi we take pride in the high standard of uniform which is described below. Jumpers, ties and girls' trousers have to be bought from YC Sports who are our approved suppliers. Their address is listed at the end of this booklet. Pupils are not allowed to buy jumpers from other suppliers and sew badges on to them. From time to time during your child's years at Corpus Christi, the school may clarify or adapt its uniform rules in response to changing fads or fashions.

The following items are compulsory:

BOYS

Black traditional style trousers.

No jeans or 'jean-like' trousers. No belts, buckles or adornments.

White long-sleeved shirt (winter)
White short-sleeved shirt (optional in summer). Both are to be worn tucked in.

Clip-on school tie - kept in good condition.

V-necked black pullover with badge.

This is a compulsory part of the uniform to be worn at all times unless at the discretion of the staff eg. hot weather

Black shoes. No trainers are allowed.

Black socks.

GIRLS

Black trousers with a moderate bootleg.

No 'skinny' trousers or 'jean-like' trousers. No belts, buckles or adornments on the trousers.

OR **Black 'A' line or pleated skirt**. (The length of the skirt must be no longer than mid-calf and no shorter than just above the knee)

White long-sleeved shirt-type blouse (winter)
White short-sleeved shirt-type blouse (optional in summer). Both are to be worn tucked in.

Clip-on school tie - kept in good condition.

V-necked black pullover with badge.

This is a compulsory part of the uniform to be worn at all times unless at the discretion of the staff eg. hot weather

Black low-heeled shoes. No boots are allowed.

Black knee length socks (not over the knee) OR thick tights (winter). Black ankle socks (summer).



Prefect

As above, but with a distinctive tie.

Design & Technology

An apron is required for Design & Technology and Food Technology.

Outdoor Wear

Coat, anorak or mackintosh - in plain black. Coloured linings or collars are not permitted. Leather or material of a similar appearance is not allowed. Three quarter length, waist length or bomber jackets are not permitted.

School scarf or plain black scarf.

Hairstyles

Hair must be kept neat and tidy.

No shaving, patterns, outlandish styles or colours are allowed. Boys' hair must not be longer than the bottom of their shirt collar or shorter than a number '2' blade.

Jewellery and Make Up

1 watch and one signet ring are allowed.

Girls are also allowed one pair of small studs or sleepers in the lobes of their ears only.

No other form of studs or body-piercing is permitted

No make-up or nail varnish is allowed.

Inappropriate jewellery is confiscated for a month. Trainers and/or inappropriate clothing are kept for at least a week

Equipment

Children need, of course, to be equipped for lessons. All pupils must therefore have with them:

- Ruler
- Pencil
- 2 Pens
- Set of coloured pencils (not felt pens)
- Rubber
- Pencil sharpener



SKIRTS

Skirts are plain black pleated or A line and no higher than just above the knee. No skinny-fit short or long skirts are acceptable.



TROUSERS

Trousers must be tailored. Trousers that go in at the ankle, jeans, chinos or any form of leggings are not permitted.





SHOES

Plain black shoes for boys. Low heeled plain black shoes for girls. No trainers or boots allowed.



Congratulations to the 195 Year 7 pupils and 8 members of staff who took part in the World Record attempt for the Largest Reading Lesson.


75 schools took part in the attempt and we were informed by Guinness that the record had been broken and we were now World record holders.


YEAR 7 GEOGRAPHY FIELDTRIPS

YEAR 9 GEOGRAPHY FIELDTRIPS





Year 9 went to Southerndown on a Geography field trip. While we were there, we looked at how erosion had taken place. We carried out an Environmental Quality Assessment about the area and filled in a questionnaire on why people were visiting Southerndown.

We then counted how many waves crashed on to the beach over a period of 5 minutes to see if they were constructive or destructive. Later, we measured the size and shape of the pebbles at 6-metre intervals going down the beach. Finally, we looked at the erosion of the footpath that led down to the beach.

We all had a great day as the weather was fantastic. To top it all off, we stopped and had a McDonalds to truly make it the best day ever!

Protecting Pupils from Inappropriate Apps and Websites on their Mobile Phones

Schools in Cardiff increasingly have to deal with issues regarding pupils using their mobile phones inappropriately.


Fortunately, mobile phones are not allowed to be used at all on the school premises at Corpus Christi. However, we have been made aware of some pupils having inappropriate images on their phones and sharing them outside school with other pupils. We are also conscious that during the summer holidays pupils will have more opportunity to use their phones.

As you may be aware, WIFI can filter out a lot of inappropriate content, but children are using their data allowance on 3G which is much more difficult to monitor.

Fortunately there are a number of apps that have been designed to protect our children including:



Norton Family and SecureTeen



By installing one of these apps on your child's phone you can not only monitor how they use it but also:

Block all adult sites, including mature content, nudity, violence and extremely offensive contents.

Block specific sites and apps

Filter malicious websites, phishing, suspicious links and web pages.

Stop illegal sites like gambling, hacking, drugs and peer-to-peer.

Prevent access to parent-child discussion topics.

Please discuss with your children the seriousness of sharing any illegal images or videos, and the possible repercussions such activity could have in later life.



ATTENDANCE

The whole school attendance total is currently running at 95.82%. The Welsh Assembly Government's target for pupil attendance is **95%**. Anything under this figure could mean that the Educational Welfare Service will contact you to find out why your child has been absent from school.

- It is a parent's legal responsibility to ensure their child attends school every day.
- Parents responsible for children who exhibit poor attendance risk prosecution and a Fixed Penalty Notice fine being issued by the Local Authority.
- Parents do not have an automatic right to withdraw their child from school for a holiday and, in law, have to apply for permission from the school in advance. Holidays during term time will not be authorised and will result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued by the Local Authority.

Absences due to Illness or Medical Appointment

Although you may have contacted the school by telephone or in person to notify us of your child's absence, you are still required to provide a parental note, e-mail or appointment card in order for the absence to be authorised.
