St. Francis was first inspired after visiting the actual stable in Bethlehem on a pilgrimage. There, his devotion to the Child Jesus deepened — a child born into the world in such poverty, humility, and simplicity. St. Francis sought to share this beautiful moment of history to the others. On Christmas Eve of the year 1223, St. Francis recreated the scene of Christ's birth in a special Mass he held inside of a cave in Greccio, Italy, inviting both his fellow friars and the townspeople to join in the celebration. This recreation of that first Christmas night was so popular that soon every church in Italy had its own nativity scene. The devotion also spread to private homes, and in modern times even to secular institutions all around the world.

Year 11 Visit to The Houses of Parliament 28th November 2017

Corpus Christi was once again kindly invited to attend a visit to the Houses of Parliament at the end of November. The event, organised by Archbishop Stack and the Diocese, was attended by two of our Year 11 pupils, Nicole Lundrigan and Oliver Brain. The day was very informative and exciting, witnessing first hand a debate focussing on the finer points of the Budget. We were also lucky enough to have a full guided tour of Westminster Palace and learned the procedure and rigmarole associated with passing a new law. It can take up to two years for very general laws to be passed, so we wished them well with Brexit! We were very grateful for the time Kevin Brennan, Member of Parliament for Cardiff West, gave to us. He gave us a first -hand account of the inner workings of Parliament, and recounted his interesting path into the world of politics. The highlight of the trip for the pupils was the visit to St. Mary Undercroft chapel, a rare treat for the general public. We were told first hand of the unique and diverse history of the chapel and were shown a 500 year old chalice, which is still in use today! We were also very grateful to Lord Murphy who spoke about the rich history of parliament and his enthralling time spent working as Secretary of State for Wales and Northern Ireland, and his role in the Good Friday Agreement. We finished the day with high tea, looking over the River Thames. We would like to express our thanks once again to the Archbishop and the Diocese for this wonderful opportunity.

MOBILE PHONES

The school has a very clear policy about the use of Mobile Phones by pupils on the school premises.

Pupils are **NOT** allowed to use their phones under any circumstances. If a pupil needs to contact home in an emergency, their Head of Year, Assistant Head of Year or the school office will assist them in this.

If a pupil has their phone confiscated, it is returned at the end of the day. If, however, it is subsequently confiscated, then this will involve a longer period of confiscation of up to a week. If a child's bus pass is on their phone, the office will lend them the bus fare to get home, but please inform the school via email (bmullins@cardiff.gov.uk) if you would prefer to make arrangements yourself to collect your child rather than let them make their own way home without their mobile phone.

Clearly, it is in everyone's interest that pupils do not have their phones taken and if parents could remind their children about this we, as a school, would be grateful as it makes life much easier for all concerned.

Digital Day



Digital Day took place 14th November, where a group of selected year 9 pupils undertook three challenges that promoted digital creativity.

The initiative was carried out by BIMA, an organisation whose professionals provided an insight into the digital careers that are available to the pupils, as well as their own experiences in the field.

The trip is an invaluable experience and allows our pupils to see the theory and content that we learn in class, happening in real life. Geography is a subject that should encourage and inspire our pupils to take note of the world around them and fieldwork opportunities certainly allow them to do this. It was an absolute pleasure to take Year 8 out for the day, especially when members of the public told staff that our young people are a credit to the school. Finally, alongside getting the work done for their assessment, they also enjoyed a spot of Christmas shopping and some nice lunch from the Christmas markets!

The whole school attendance total is currently running at 96.10%, which is lower than we would want it to be for this time of year. The Welsh Assembly Government's target for **pupil attendance** is <u>95%</u>. Anything under this figure could mean that the Educational Welfare Service will contact you to find out why your child has been absent from school.

Children are not allowed to go on holiday during term time.

Absences due to Illness or Medical Appointment

Although you may have contacted the school by telephone, E-mail or in person to notify us of your child's absence, you are still required to provide a parental note, E-mail or appointment card in order for the absence to be authorised. In certain circumstances of illness medical evidence may be requested in order to authorise your child's absence.






Year 11 CoPE Group - Cardiff City Centre Homeless Project






YEAR 11 COPE TRIP TO BATH

To parents of Year 10 pupils:

Due to recent changes to the exam entry system implemented by Welsh Government, the planned early entry/resit option for GCSE Mathematics and Mathematics-Numeracy has very recently been abolished. As of September 2018, the grades achieved by pupils' first entry will now count towards the GCSE results of Summer 2019. As a result, most pupils will now sit all four examinations in the May/June of Year 11. Those pupils who have completed both GCSE courses, and are able to achieve their full potential by November 2018 (typically Set 1 and Set 2), may be considered for the November GCSE examinations. This will allow a number of Higher Tier students to begin the Additional Mathematics course. For those pupils who have started Year 10 following the Intermediate Tier courses, they will still have the opportunity to complete their studies at Higher Tier. Mock examinations will be set in place of the November GCSE examinations in Year 11. Should pupils achieve at least one B grade at Intermediate Tier, they will sit the GCSE examinations at Higher Tier and have the opportunity to achieve A* to C grades. For learners who achieve at least one D grade at Foundation Tier in the November mocks, they will continue their studies at Intermediate Tier, aiming for C and B grades.

School Uniform Update

A big thank you to parents for complying with the uniform rules regarding shoes this year. We have only had to 'make available' two pairs of shoes since September, which is a huge improvement on last year.

On a more negative note, we need to reinforce rules about school skirts. The length of the skirt should be no shorter than just above the knee. Unfortunately, a minority of girls are wearing skirts that, quite frankly, are causing embarrassment to members of staff and visitors to the school.

- DO NOT EAT OR DRINK ON THE BUS
- DO NOT BLOCK AISLES OR EXITS WITH BAGS
- DO NOT DISTRACT THE DRIVER
- DO NOT STAND UP UNTIL THE BUS HAS STOPPED. YOU MUST REMAIN SEATED THROUGHOUT THE JOURNEY.
- . YOU MUST WEAR A SEATBELT
